



Your jewellery is more than a bunch of shiny add-ons; it's memories you can wear. Maybe it's the ring you fiddle with during boring meetings or the earrings you pop in every morning without thinking.

Whether it's a family heirloom or a budget-friendly favourite, every piece needs a [little love to stay sparkling](#)

But sunscreen, dust, and hand cream can all dull its sparkle. The good news is that cleaning your jewellery is super easy once you learn a few tricks. Want to bring back that just-bought shine? Keep reading.

Step 1: Inspect Every Piece

Before you start scrubbing, soaking, or polishing your pieces like you're restoring buried treasure, take a minute to actually look at what you're dealing with.

Different materials behave very differently, and the wrong cleaning method can turn a shiny favourite into a sad reminder of what it was.

So, lay your pieces out somewhere well-lit and spacious, like your dining table or the kitchen bench. Now, let's look at the main types you probably have:

- Silver. Silver is quick to react with the air, which is why it sometimes tarnishes even when

you swear you've just cleaned it. Usually, a soft cloth and the right cleaner are all it needs to bounce back.

- Gold. Gold looks sturdy, but it scratches faster than you'd think. Skip the heavy scrubbing and treat it with a softer touch. Think of it like dealing with someone who insists they're low-maintenance, but they absolutely aren't.
- Gemstones. Here's where things get delicate. Some stones, like opals or pearls, don't love moisture and can be damaged by even mild soaps. Others, like diamonds and sapphires, can handle a gentle clean but still need care around the metalwork.

Before picking up a cloth or cleaner, check for loose clasps, wobbly stones, bent prongs, or anything looking a bit 'held together by luck.' If something feels fragile or is considered a family heirloom, don't risk it. Pop it aside and check with a jeweller first.

Step 2: Gather Your Cleaning Supplies

Don't wait until you get started and then hunt for everything you'll need. It's honestly a lifesaver to have your tools ready when you're sprucing up your jewellery.

Here's what you'll want to keep close:

- A soft cloth to dry and polish your pieces without leaving scratches;
- A gentle soap to dissolve residue;
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A soft-bristled brush to push out dirt from those fiddly little gaps.

All that talk about cleaning probably reminds you of similar household chores waiting to be done. If you want to focus more on your jewellery, you can bring in a [monthly cleaning service](#), and they'll help you with all the tidying up.

Step 3: Prepare the Cleaning Solution

Having lined up all your tools, you still need to do one more thing: whip up a good cleaner.

Grab a small bowl, fill it with warm water, and stir in a smidge of mild soap. A teaspoon is quite enough. This mild blend will get rid of dirt without being harsh, so it's perfect for most of your accessories.

Set yourself up somewhere with decent lighting so you can actually see what you're doing. Bright light will make it easier to check for dirt hiding in corners and spot anything that looks fragile before you continue.

Step 4: Soak and Gently Clean the Items

Got some jewellery that's looking a bit dull? Let's get it brand-new.

Start by placing your pieces into the warm, soapy water you just prepared. Let it soak for a few minutes so the mixture can loosen up any oils, dust, and everyday build-up that's been hiding out in the crevices.

Next, grab a soft brush. An old toothbrush is perfect, but a fluffy makeup brush works, too, if the piece is fragile. Lightly scrub around the little corners and details. Those are the spots where dust and grime tend to hide.

If you're working with a delicate piece, like pearls, opals, or anything that makes you nervous just looking at it, be extra gentle. Water can damage some gemstones, so stick to surface-cleaning.

Step 5: Rinse and Dry Thoroughly

By now, your jewellery should already be looking brighter, but there's one more important step to keep that shine from fading again. Leftover soap can cling to surfaces and sneak into tiny

corners, making things look dull all over.

Use warm water (the same comfortable temperature you used earlier). Avoid shocking your pieces with anything too hot or too cold; some stones respond badly to sudden temperature changes and can crack or swell.

And here's a tip that'll save you from the heart-stopping moment every jewellery owner knows too well: plug the sink or place a small bowl inside and rinse everything over that instead.

It'll only take two seconds, but it'll completely remove the risk of your earring making a dramatic dive toward the drain.

Once rinsed, grab a soft cloth and gently pat your pieces dry. Pressing too hard can scratch smooth surfaces, so go easy.

As for the items with intricate designs or tiny crevices, let them air dry to chase away hidden moisture and prevent tarnish.

Step 6: Polish to Restore Shine

You've cleaned your jewellery—nice work! Now, let's make it really shine. Polishing is that extra step that will keep your favourite pieces looking fresh, sparkly, and ready to wear.

All you need is a soft polishing cloth made for jewellery. If you don't have one on hand, a clean, soft cotton cloth will still help buff away fingerprints and add a gentle shine.

As you polish, keep a few things in mind. Try to stick to the metal only and avoid rubbing the stones directly, especially if they're on the softer side.

If you're working with plated jewellery, go easy, because frequent polishing can wear the plating down faster than you'd expect. And if you've got [rhodium-plated white gold](#), skip polishing completely; it can thin the rhodium layer and leave the piece looking patchy.

If something looks badly tarnished or super delicate, it's perfectly okay to ditch at-home methods and get help. Professional jewellers have the right tools to fix heavy wear safely.
