The trout from Lough Ree on the River Shannon make for a delicious and meaty meal. Salmon are another popular choice for those embarking on an Irish fishing expedition, as they are regularly found on the west coast of the country. An individual interested in night fishing will get a thrill out of searching for migratory sea trout that pop up in the moonlight.

Fortunately for fishing enthusiasts on a budget, there are a number of free or affordable fishing opportunities in Ireland. The western seaboard is home to a number of well-known fishing houses, as well as a scenic backdrop for adventures on the water. A person can choose relatively inexpensive accommodations that allow them to fish in the Ox Mountains, and can also do some trout fishing in Lough Talt for free. The 100-acre Lough Easky has an abundance of salmon and sea trout. For those looking to spend a bit more, opportunities to do so are plentiful. A fisherman can fork over more than \$1,000 to enjoy three nights and two days of fishing in a luxury fishing lodge. This type of fishing enthusiast can also enjoy fishing the River Nore, where one day's worth of salmon fishing is priced at \$170.

"There is no shortage of opportunities to fish in Ireland," notes Henri Degre. "Not only does the fisherman get to enjoy plentiful varieties of fish, but they also get to take in some of the most majestic views in the world. Heading to Ireland to fish is a dream of many fishing enthusiasts."
