One of the riskiest things a motorist can do is to use a speech-to-text system. "Speech-to-text systems allow drivers to send texts and emails by speaking, then having the technology translate words into a written message," the article states. "Some systems also allow drivers to complete other tasks, such as updating their Facebook page." While this may seem fairly low-risk, it is actually extremely dangerous; the cognitive work required is a major distraction to the driver.

Along the same lines, according to the report, hands-free cellphone use--sometimes thought to be a safe activity for drivers--is actually just as dangerous as any other kind of cellphone use, because of the cognitive distraction that accompanies it.

This is not to say that hand-held cellphone use is off the hook, however. "For years, auto safety advocates, car insurance companies and other critics have blamed hand-held cellphones for causing significant distractions and leading to accidents and fatalities," notes Fox Business. As a result, several states have actually outlawed handheld phone use, though it remains a major problem nationwide.
